## President's Report Midyear – May 4, 2025

Welcome to Midyear 2025. Thank you to the 17<sup>th</sup> District for hosting today's event. Thank you to everyone for attending today, it is important that you are here to conduct the business of the Council.

Congratulations to our Scholarship recipients who will be recognized this afternoon. There were many deserving candidates, but unfortunately, we have a limited number of scholarships to award. I wish all the applicant's great success in their future endeavors and look forward to seeing their impact on the world in the future.

I would like to thank all our officers and squads for being engaged, following what is going on with EMS and providing comments and input on the issues. Legislation is a hot topic at the moment, and I was very impressed with the number of people who responded to several recent emails that went out. Thank you for your comments and concerns.

Yes, the new Training Fund Law is going to provide some challenges for our squads. I have had several conversations with staff from DOH/OEMS regarding the changes and new procedures. They have been very responsive to our questions and have worked to keep us in the loop on what is happening. Some of our Executive Officers met with them a few weeks ago via Zoom and had a productive meeting.

I have been working closely with our advocates from ABS to craft a "clean up" bill to address some of the issues that are in the current law such as the one call a month requirement. They have been working with legislators to get the bill introduced once we have all the issues identified and know the direction we want to go. We will be asking for support from the members once the bill is introduced.

While legislation has been in the forefront, many of our committees have been working diligently to fulfill their missions. Bylaws have had several productive meetings and are getting close to a finished product. The budget committee has met and will present a preliminary budget today. The Reimbursement and Best Practices Committee has met and will be presenting their work in the near future. Cadet Resources and Membership Benefits have also been working to put together resources for our members.

The Convention Committee has been hard at work planning our October Symposium and Trade show for October 17-19, 2025. Class proposals are being reviewed, and more

information will be out in the coming months. Please remember, at this time we will not be getting any money from the EMT Training Fund so we will be doing some things differently for this year's convention. We will be making a presentation asking for funding at the next EMT Training Fund Advisory meeting but there are no guarantees of any funding.

I would like to give a big thank you to every one of our members. Your unselfish dedication to providing EMS care to the residents and visitors of the great state of New Jersey is greatly appreciated and does not go unnoticed. It takes a lot of hard work, time, and sacrifice to keep a squad up and running and these efforts are often overlooked.

Lastly, I would like to say thank you to everyone for your support. Learning the ropes as President has been a bit of a challenge. I appreciate everyone who has answered my questions, called with pointers and advice or who have just reached out to say they are there for when I figure out what I need them to do. It truly takes a village to run this organization.

Per the Bylaws, dues received by the District Treasurer between April 1 and June 30 are subject to a 20% late fee and those received after July 1 are subject to a 40% late fee. District Treasurers are responsible for remitting dues to the Council within ten days of receipt, inclusive of any late fees. The Board of Trustees may vote to waive the late fees of any Squad once per five years.

All funds we were expecting from the EMT Training Fund related to the 2024 Symposium have been received. That said, if the law is not revised, this shortfall is likely the biggest driver of any changes that we make between the proposed 2026 budget attached and the final proposal that will be presented to the member Squads for approval in October.

While we will likely exceed this year's budget due to some one-time expenses, we believe the 2026 budget is likely to return to "normal" and we only foresee spending \$250 more next year than we anticipated for 2025, if the EMT Training Fund law is revised. Thanks to Sue DeWitt and Sue VanOrden for their help in reviewing the budget proposal ahead of today's meeting.

Finally, the Reimbursement and Financial Best Practices committee also met. We are awaiting some information from the Convention Committee and intend to have a proposal for the June executive board meeting.

The usual list of bills paid since the last Board meeting and to be paid at this Mid-Year meeting will be circulated by e-mail next weekend to allow for any submissions received on or before this Wednesday, April 30, along with our year-to-date budget vs. actuals.

# CONVRATULATIONS 17th District!

On your hosting of the 96th Anniversary MidYear Assembly. We know how hard all of you have worked to present a fantastic MidYear for all Council members and it is greatly appreciated. Thank you for your hard work!

The EMT Training Fund law continues to be the focus of attention at all District and Council meetings. Not only the flaws, but the remedy as well. Squad Captains are looking to understand the process to be followed. Squad Treasurers are looking to understand the long-term financial impact. New members are questioning their ability to fulfill a 3 year commitment. OEMS is questioning the long-term sustainability of the EMT Training Fund.

Some of the issues and questions that need to be addressed:

When does the clock start for the beginning of that 3-year volunteer commitment of 1 call per month for initial EMT students?

Changing the 1 call per month to 12 per year.

Does the 1 call per month or 12 calls/year apply beyond the 3-year initial period if an EMT uses the training fund for recertification purposes?

Newly certified EMTs who attend.some NJ colleges are exempt from the 1 call per month and reimbursing the fund. This should be expanded to all US colleges and military service.

Does your squad need to create a policy that defines the qualifications of a "member, in good standing"?

What exactly does this mean...

"Does NOT receive any monetary compensation in the form of an hourly wage, a salary, or ANY other form of financial remuneration provided for or in connection with the provision of basic life support services;" We know this doesn't apply to LOSAP. What about clothing allowance? Stipend? Or any other type of monetary incentive to get people to join, stay, or give more time?

To what extent does the head of an ambulance corps legally have to "seek reimbursement" from a student/EMT for a third party, the State of NJ. At what cost?

The EMT Training Fund law and its remedy, is just one of the issues that the EMSCNJ is actively addressing. NJ EMS is at a point in time where there are major issues that impact us and will greatly affect volunteer EMS in the next few months:

- New OEMS platform
- Background checks/ fingerptinting Who pays? Will OEMS share results with the home squad without additional charges? Is there an additional charge for each recertification cycle?
- New EMT competencies
- New EMT regulations
- Upcoming OSHA requirements

The EMS Council of NJ continues to believe in a volunteer system and it's sustainability working with paid services for the future.

# *Membership Secretary*May 4, 2025 – Mid-Year Assembly

Hello everyone and welcome to the 2025 Mid-Year Assembly, hosted by the 17<sup>th</sup> District. Thank you to the members and squads of the 17<sup>th</sup> District for all of your work in preparing for and hosting our Mid-Year Assembly – everything looks great.

We currently have 201 squads in the Council. As of the 4/15/2025 deadline for squad eligibility to vote at this Mid-Year, 126 squads have submitted their Annual Reports with 122 of those being accepted (60.70% of the total 201 squads), and of these 113 squads are currently in Good Standing (56.22%); these are the squads with Annual Reports that are accepted, Standards Inspections completed and Annual Dues submitted. The District Squad Status reports for Mid-Year were emailed to the District VPs and Chairs and to the respective Area VPs. Thanks to all of the squads who have submitted their reports. For the squads that are not yet in compliance please continue to submit your Annual Reports, complete your Inspections and submit any unpaid Dues. We would like to have 100% compliance throughout the Council.

Remember that Squads can make changes to any part of the Squad entries in the Database at any time during the year, except for Section 4 (Reports/Data) which is your data from the prior year (2024) and should only be updated once as close to the beginning of the year as possible. If your squad officers are unable to log into the Database, the officers can request a password reset but this request must come from the Squad Captain/Chief or President. Please send an email to <a href="mailto:membershipsecretary@emscnj.org">membershipsecretary@emscnj.org</a> to request this.

If you need service award certificates for your squad, please request them at least two weeks in advance as the US Mail is not as reliable as it has been. When requesting certificates please include the members' names, the squad name, the years of service and the date you want on certificate along with the address where you want the certificates mailed. The certificates will be mailed via regular first-class mail as the cost of Priority Mail has increased in the past year. And don't forget that we can also provide certificates for squads that are celebrating a milestone year.

As of the first week of April OEMS is requesting emails from squads listing their squad members who are taking EMT classes and attesting that these members are eligible to use the EMT Training Fund for their initial or CORE EMT classes, to be completed retroactively for any courses that started on or after April 1, 2025. This is a temporary step until the online electronic forms are ready for use. There will be some changes to the procedure that training agencies use to submit their students' EMT Training Fund eligibilities, voucher and report forms. If your squad has not complied with OEMS' request to send them the names and information for 3 officers who are approved to submit training fund information to OEMS please do so as soon as possible as this information will be used for the electronic completion, signing and submission of EMT Training Fund forms.

Today we are also commemorating the passing of Mary Ann Ferrara, who served our Council for many years. In addition to holding the office of Council President for 4 years, she held the offices of Northern Area Vice President, 3<sup>rd</sup> District Vice President, and Captain of the Ridgefield First Aid & Ambulance Corps. Mary Ann also was a Life Member of the Ridgefield First Aid & Ambulance Corps as well as volunteering as a member of the Little Silver First Aid Squad. Mary Ann also taught at the Immaculate Heart Academy and then at Hoboken High School, where she pioneered the Hoboken HS Volunteer Ambulance Corps (and taught their EMT class). She was an EMT Instructor, NJ State EMT Evaluator and served on the State Faculty. We honor Mary Ann for her many years of dedication to EMS and Education and all she accomplished. She is sorely missed. We are glad to have Mary Ann's sisters here for this Memorial along with several of her former squad members. May her memory be a blessing.

#### 8th DISTRICT REPORT

The 8<sup>th</sup> District is in the midst of Standards Inspections. All of our Annual reports have been excepted except for one. All of our squads have paid their dues.

At a recent meeting we discussed the aging of our delegates. There seems to be little interest in new people attending District meetings or getting involved with the Council. One suggestion was for each squad to bring a "friend" to our next meeting.

All of our squads are confused about the new training fund law and what it means to recertify current members. Many have discussed "retirement" due to the recertification process that will be in force. This bill will probably cause the loss of many volunteer EMTs. Also, the restriction of EMTs working in a hospital will be forced to choose only their employee training with no option except for self-pay. The 1 call per month is an issue. Also, those squads that have duty shifts feel that should be taken into consideration too. Their shift may not have a call.

Another topic for discussion was over the Reciprocity Law. There still is no word on background checks. Despite the fact that the State is mandating this, they are covering themselves by saying the State is not liable for costs incurred.

We congratulate the 17<sup>th</sup> District on their plans for Midyear. Several of our Delegates will be attending and we look forward to seeing everyone.

The form for submission of awards has been revised and will be up on the Council website soon. The biggest change is we are NOT accepting mail submissions. All the applications need to be sent by email to the committee. Then they will be evaluated by independent process. Deadline for submission of Award applications will be **August 15**<sup>th</sup>. Traffic contest runs from August 1 through July 31<sup>st</sup>. Deadline for submission of traffic awards applications will be **September 15**<sup>th</sup>. These will be firm dates! - Meetings attended since our annual meeting in 2024 include:

- June 1<sup>st</sup> will be upon us soon, and so begins the 2025 hurricane season. Be sure to maintain situational awareness regarding weather alerts for both your own and neighboring jurisdictions responses.
- We ask you to ensure all your members are familiar with the current JEMSTAR protocols. November 2024 saw a modification in dispatch guidelines. Your local air medical service can provide clarification and/or training.
- State wide trauma guidelines have been updated, and will be released within the next couple of months.
   You should contact either your local ALS provider or the trauma center for your area for additional information.
- Please review and disseminate the updated ICS and MCI training guidelines and management requirements. Additionally, these guidelines identify which personnel are expected to complete the education. The EMSCNJ website offers additional detail. As with any skill, these get better with practice.

#### **Current Landscape:**

The Legislature has been mainly on budget break for the last month, providing time for the Senate and Assembly Budget Committees to hold public and Department hearings on FY26. While that work continues into May, the Legislature is also resuming regular committee meetings tomorrow with activity running through the end of June. The budget must be signed into law by June 30.

The Governor and Assembly are up for election in November, with the primary set for June 10.

#### **Priority Issue Update:**

EMT Training Fund Law: We have been working with Assemblyman Sterley Stanley office on clean-up legislation to address the problematic provisions in the recently enacted EMT Training Fund Law. Stanley was the sponsor of the law. The draft legislation expands the courses that are eligible for reimbursement, changes the requirement of one call per month to 12 per year and includes clarifying language providing exemption to students in ALL colleges and universities. Before finalizing the language, the Council is seeking answers from NJDOE regarding implementation of the law to ensure the that the clean-up bill indeed addresses all the outstanding concerns.

Once a bill is introduced, we will be calling on the full membership to urge their legislators to sign on in support. Strategic coordination is essential—if the bill is introduced under the wrong sponsor, it will not advance.

Board of Paramedicine Legislation – A4523 (Murphy/Wimberly) / S3563 (Vitale/McKnight) No significant updates on the Board of Paramedicine Bill since our meeting last month. Should the bill be posted for consideration, we have requested an amendment removing BLS entirely from the bill. It's important to note that no amendments can be made to the

bill unless it advances through committee. Given the Council's firm opposition, the hope is it simply remains stalled.

<u>S788</u> (Gordon) - Exempts certain volunteer first responders from coverage under "unemployment compensation law"; excludes from gross income amounts received for certain volunteer emergency services. **Status**: On 3/3/24 S788 passed Senate Labor Committee—the first meeting that Senator Gordon was presiding as chair. ABS testified in support of the bill on behalf of the Council. The bill awaits consideration in Senate Budget. Assembly companion bill, A-1429 (Haider), cleared Assembly Labor in October with the Council's support; it's now awaiting consideration in Assembly Appropriations. Earlier this month, the EMS Council/ABS participated in a meeting with Senator Johnson's Office, Assemblywoman Haider and the NJDOL to address concerns from the Department about withholdings. There appears to be some confusion over what is considered to be renumeration of services.

S2887 (Greenstein) - Provides certain volunteer and other workers with maximum compensation benefit for workers' compensation claim regardless of outside employment. Summary: This bill ensures that certain volunteer workers, including firefighters and first aid or rescue squad members, receive the maximum workers' compensation benefits for injury or death, regardless of whether they have other employment. It is a response to the New Jersey Supreme Court case, *Kocanowski v. Township of Bridgewater* (2019), where the Court ruled that all volunteer firefighters should receive the highest possible compensation, regardless of their income history. The bill clarifies existing law to eliminate any confusion about these workers' eligibility for full workers' compensation benefits. Status: On 3/3/25, S2887 passed Senate Labor Committee, referred to Senate Budget. A2771 awaits consideration in Assembly Labor Committee.

#### Legislation—Monitoring--No Progress since last report

<u>S1416</u> (Singleton/Beach)/A4022 (Sumter/Moen)—Requires DOH to Develop Statewide Emergency Services Plan—On 2/3/25 the Senate Health & Human Services Committee unanimously released S1416 and referred it to Senate Budget. ABS flagged the bill, and Sue Dewitt shared the Council's concerns, which ABS will discuss with the sponsors. We are requesting a meeting with Senator Singleton.

<u>S2386</u> – Provides Tax Cred for Volunteer First Responders' Vehicle Use--On February 3, S2386 passed Senate Budget & Appropriations and now awaits consideration in the full Senate. A3532 awaits consideration in Assembly Appropriations. advanced in a 12-0 vote.

S3536 (Gopal)/A5008 (Donlon)—Concerns Distribution of 9-1-1 System and Emergency Response Trust Fund Account. S3536 was up for discussion in Senate Law and Public Safety Committee on February 13. No vote was taken. A5008 awaits consideration in Assembly Public Safety Committee. The bill proposes changes to how money from the 9-1-1 System and Emergency Response Trust Fund is used. This fund, collected through a small surcharge on phone bills, is meant to support emergency

response services and 9-1-1 system improvements in New Jersey. The bill adds two new funding priorities:

- 1. **Recruitment and retention of first responders** Money from the fund can now be used to help bring in and keep emergency personnel, including EMTs.
- 2. Support for the New Jersey EMS Task Force Five percent of the total fund will go directly to NJ EMS Task Force.

S3937 (Amato)/A5107 (Myhre)--requires public utility to charge a volunteer emergency service organization a residential rate for service delivered to the property at which the volunteer emergency service organization primarily operates, if the residential rate is lower than the commercial rate for the service at that property. In consultation with the Board of Public Utilities, a public utility is to establish a reasonable procedure for an organization to certify itself as a volunteer emergency service organization with the public utility for this purpose. Under the bill, "volunteer emergency service organization" means an organization that relies on volunteer members to provide emergency services, including, but not limited to, fire department, first aid, emergency, ambulance, or rescue squad services. The bill has been referred to Senate Economic Growth Committee. S3937 was introduced December 9, 2024, referred to Senate Economic Growth. A5107 was introduced December 12 and referred to Assembly Telecommunications & Utilities Committee.

S2376 (Beach/Vitale)/A2255 (Lopez/Conaway)—Requires boards of education to ensure that all staff are trained in care of students with epilepsy and seizure disorders every five years.

**Status:** S2376 passed Senate Education on 9/30/24, awaiting full vote in Senate. A2255 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Education Committee.

A-2100 (Kennedy/Lopez/S1470 (Lagana/Scutari) -- Provides workers' compensation benefits for certain public safety workers who developed illness or injury as result of responding to September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks..

**Status:** A2100 passed Assembly Labor on 9/19/24, referred to Assembly Public Safety. S1470 passed Senate Labor on 1/25/24, referred to Senate Budget & Appropriations.

S3278 (Singleton) / A4280 (Calabrese/Speight) – the original versions of these bills extended permission to administer blood glucose tests and glucagon to EMTs. Both were heard in committee in May, A4280 in Assembly Regulated Professions and S3278 in Senate Health, where they were amended and released. The amendment to A4280 eliminated glucagon, bill still permits glucose tests, and amendment to S3278 provides that the Commissioner of Health may by regulation or order modify, suspend, or terminate the certification of an emergency medical technician to administer glucagon and blood glucose tests, if necessary for public health, safety, or welfare. After discussions on the bill, it's our understanding that the Assembly amendments will be applied to the Senate bill and the purpose of the legislation was to put pressure on NJDOH to move on the waiver ASAP to allow EMTs to use Glucometers—which happened in June. As FYI, eight states allow EMTs to administer glucagon—Alaska, Illinois, Kansas, Minnesota, Rhode Island, Virginia and Wisconsin.

A4284 (Danielson/Coughlin) / S3366 (Bucco/Corrado)--this bill allows firefighters and members of any first aid or rescue squad in New Jersey to apply for and receive the special license plate for no additional cost, except for any fees prescribed by law for the registration of the firefighter's or member's vehicle. A-4284 cleared Assembly Transportation Committee on 5/2/24 and posted for consideration in Assembly Appropriations tomorrow, 6/24. S3366 was introduced June 3 and referred to Senate Transportation.

A1754 (Rumpf/Spearman)/S2083 (Gopal/Corrado)— Allows certain volunteer firefighters, rescue and first aid squad members to claim \$2,000 gross income tax exemption.

Status: A1754 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee. S2083 passed Senate Law & Public Safety Committee on May 16, referred to Assembly Appropriations.

<u>S2386</u> (Gopal/Moriarity) / <u>A3532</u> (Donlon/Miller)— Provides gross income tax credit to active members of volunteer emergency service organizations for use of personal motor vehicle in performance of active duty.

**Status:** A3532 passed Assembly Public Safety Committee 6/3/24, referred to Assembly Appropriations. S2386 passed Senate Public Safety Committee 5/16/24, referred to Senate Budget & Appropriations.

SCR82 (Gopal/Moriarity) / ACR110 (Peterpaul/Miller)— Proposes constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to provide partial property tax exemption of up to 15 percent of assessed value for primary residence of certain volunteer first responders. Status: SCR82 passed Senate Law & Public Safety, referred to Senate Budget. ACR110 awaits consideration in Assembly Public Safety.

#### Increased Medicaid Reimbursement Rates for Emergency Ambulance Services:

The Medical Transport Association of NJ asked for the Council's support on a white paper sounding the alarm on the need for the state to increase Medicaid transportation reimbursement rate for ground ambulance providers that offer EMS transport to patients. The NJDHS, internally increased the reimbursement rate to \$200, ONLY for the traditional Medicaid patients, which is 3% of the population. The other 97% are enrolled in Medicaid Managed Care Organizations -MCOs, so the increase doesn't really help the industry especially since the rate is the lowest in the nation and 30 years without an increase. MTANJ is urging the state to increase rates and codify by approving the following pending legislation. Status: On Thursday, March 14, <u>\$1423</u> (Singleton/Vitale) cleared the Senate Health, Human Services, and Senior Citizens Committee with the EMS Council of NJ on record in support. The bill would increase the minimum Medicaid reimbursement rate to \$300 for basic life support emergency ambulance transportation services. This would represent an increase of \$242 from the state's existing reimbursement rate of \$58. In addition, the bill would provide for an additional \$8.94 in reimbursement for each loaded mile traveled. Currently, New Jersey has the lowest Medicaid reimbursement rate for these services in the region, with other state's ranging from \$65.27 in Delaware to \$293.90 in Connecticut. S1423 was second referenced to Senate Budget. The Assembly version,

<u>A3650</u> (Murphy), was introduced on February 12, 2024 and referred to Assembly Aging and Human Services Committee.

A4255 (Rodrigues)--Appropriates \$1.5 million to establish an EMT Workforce Development Partnership within the Department of Health. The purpose of the bill is to create a pathway for high school students, ages 16 years and older, students of institutions of higher education, and community residents to become certified EMTs.

Statues: The legislation was introduced May 2 and awaits consideration in the Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee.

A3832 (Barlas/DePhillips)/S927 (Corrado/Bucco)-- Allows certain volunteer firefighters, rescue and first aid squad members to claim \$5,000 income tax deduction.

Status: A3892 introduced 2-22-24, referred to Assembly Law & Public Safety Committee; S297 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Law & Public Safety Committee.

<u>A3086</u> (Guardian)/S1388 (Singleton)— Permits inclusion of volunteer firefighters and other emergency responders within municipal eligible employee group for purposes of the small employer health benefits plan statutes.

Status: A3086 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly State & Local Government Committee. S1388 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Community & Urban Affairs.

A4005 (Conaway/Karabinchak)/S1607 (Scanlon)— Requires emergency medical technicians and firefighters to receive training concerning electric vehicle fires. Status: A4005 was introduced 3-7-24, referred to Assembly Public Safety.S1607introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Law Public Safety

A2380 (Spearman/Moen)— Provides \$1,000 income tax deduction for certain volunteer firefighters and members of first aid and rescue squads. First aid and rescue squad members would be eligible if they serve as a volunteer for the entire tax year, respond to at least 10 percent of regular alarms and 60 percent of the drills, and have passed an approved training program or qualified as an emergency 11 medical technician.

Status: A2380 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee.

<u>\$620</u> (**Tiver**)— Allows certain volunteer firefighters, rescue and first aid squad members to claim \$500 income tax deduction.

Status: Introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Public Safety.

<u>ACR55</u> (DiMaio/Kean)/SCR53 (Testa)— Proposes constitutional amendment to authorize municipalities to provide property tax credit of up to 100 percent for primary residence of volunteer firefighter or volunteer first aid squad member.

**Status:** ACR55 introduced 1-9-24 Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee. SCR53 introduced 1-9-24 and referred to Senate Community & Urban Affairs.

<u>ACR72</u> (Tully/Swain)— Proposes constitutional amendment requiring Legislature to enact statute authorizing \$200 property tax credit for primary residence of volunteer firefighter or first aid squad member.

**Status:** ACR72 introduced 1-9-24, referred the Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee.

<u>A1353</u> (DePhillips/Webber)/S2100 (Shepisi)—Establishes Volunteer Emergency Loan Redemption Program in Higher Education Assistance Authority. Provides \$16,000 loan redemption (over 3 years) for volunteer emergency first resonder.

Status: A1353 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Higher Education. A2100 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Higher Education Committee.

A321 (Matsikoudis)/S969 (Corrado/Cryan)-- Streamlines emergency medical technician certification process for certain veterans. The bill amends current law to provide that an applicant for emergency medical technician (EMT-Basic) certification, who is a servicemember, is to be certified by the Commissioner of Health as an EMT-Basic, if the applicant: (1) possesses a current emergency medical technician certification from the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians; (2) served or currently serves as a Combat Army Medic, a Navy Hospital Corpsman, or as the equivalent of a Combat Army Medic or a Navy Hospital Corpsman in a separate branch of the Armed Forces or the National Guard of any state; and (3) completes and passes a criminal history record background check under standards established by the commissioner.

Status: A321 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Health. S969 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Health & Human Services.

<u>A355 (Stanley)</u>— Revises requirements and training standards for first responders under New Jersey Highway Traffic Safety Act of 1987

Status: Introduced 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Public Safety & Preparedness Committee.

<u>S1470</u> (Lagana/Scutari)/A2100 (Kennedy/Lopez)— Provides workers' compensation benefits for certain public safety workers who developed illness, injury, or who died as a result of responding to the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks, regardless of when the claim is filed (eliminates statute of limitations), provided that the worker was treated or monitored through the World Trade Center Health Program established by the Centers for Disease Control.

**Status:** S1470 passed Senate Labor Committee on 1-25-24, referred to Senate Budget Committee. A2100 was introduced on 1-9-24, referred to Assembly Labor Committee.

A432 (Auth)— Streamlines certification standards for emergency medical technicians. Status: A432 introduced 1-9-24, referred to Senate Health.

<u>A704</u> (Torrissi)—Establishes Emergency Services Assistance Grant Program in DOH, appropriates \$10million.

Status: Introduced 1/9/24, referred to Assembly Health.

<u>A1243</u> (Sauickie)— Establishes Emergency Medical Services Provider Safety Grant Program in DOH; appropriates \$10 million.

Status: Introduced 1/9/24, referred to Assembly Health.

#### NJ DOH Committees Report May 5, 2025 – Mid-Year

Good day.

The Governor's EMS Advisory Council met on March 19, 2025. The relevant portions of this meeting are as follows: <a href="EMT Training Fund Council report">EMT Training Fund Council report</a> – the report was emailed to the Chairperson. The NJAPP representative asked to confirm the section of the new law where hospital based full time EMTs on the hospital BLS rigs are not able to use the EMT TF even in their volunteer agencies – Dan Kazar confirmed this. The question was then asked if someone takes an initial EMT program and rides with a volunteer agency and then after two years gets hired for a hospital based BLS service, will the EMT have to refund the money from the EMT Training Fund? Dan replied this was an interpretation that had not been discussed and did not know if this would become the procedure, but he would ask DOH Legal section for an interpretation. The administration of the new EMT TF law is still being reviewed by Legal after the suggestions from the EMT TF Council were made.

<u>MAC Sub-Committee report</u> – the MAC discussed a 'trauma gel' which is being sold commercially that can be squirted into wounds for bleeding control. It was developed for military use but is now moving into pre-hospital care. Both Dr. Schreibman and Dr. Porter said this is not approved for NJ BLS use.

OEMS report – Candace Gardner was not present so Dan Kazar presented the report. He introduced Brian Clancy, a new hire at OEMS. The white inspection sticker on DOH licensed ambulances will be changed to colors to indicate rig inspection renewal years and should make it easier to see if the inspections are overdue. The new NJEMS (NJLINCS) platform will be going live within the next couple of weeks – this is supposed to happen by April 1 as per the new EMT TF law but may be happen a few days afterwards; it is still undergoing testing. The platform was in need of updates, and the time line was pushed forward due to the implementation of BLS-ALS background checks and the implementation of the requirements of the new EMT TF law. The BLS-ALS protocols were reviewed and updated again. Dan stated that ALS would be using these, and it is up to the BLS agency's Medical Director to decide whether or not to follow those guidelines. The new EMS Regulations are still under review with DOH Legal - they are meeting weekly. Regarding the required background checks - fingerprints will only be accepted from Identigo, and a code will be distributed so the results will be sent to OEMS. Dan believes it will be possible to submit more than one code so that results will go to OEMS and to your squad, or a hospital, for example. But fingerprints will need to be taken at this time even if you've had them taken previously as the code number cannot be retroactively added to prior prints. The prints will be run by OEMS every 3 years when NJ EMT cards are renewed so no additional fees will be required to take your fingerprints again. OEMS cannot forward the background check report to your squad but if something is found that would result in your losing your EMT certification they will make notification, and it would be posted in the enforcement section of their website. ALS background checks will be starting soon for a small test group, then all ALS practitioners. After any bugs are worked out they will start the background checks for BLS. To make it easier for everyone they are working with Identigo to have mobile locations set up around the state to take the fingerprints. Confirmation of background checks will be on the new NJEMS platform. The EMT Training Fund eligibility will be all electronic, and the focus is now on the volunteer EMT's eligibility, not the eligibility of the agency. Forms will be electronic and can be signed online; OEMS does have to translate this form into 7 languages. OEMS will be setting up regional meetings with agencies to explain the process. EMTs' eligibility will be confirmed by their squad's principal officers as submitted to OEMS per their emailed request. The updated, revised EMT CORE Recertification programs will be going out to Instructors soon –

it will include the new interventions from the waivers in August and will update the educational requirements utilizing Bloom's Taxonomy to improve student assessments. Students also must demonstrate clinical competency – being an EMT for a number of years does **not** guarantee automatically passing the class. (This was stressed by Dan). They are planning an emergency MAC meeting in the next couple of weeks. UMDNJ, Atlantic Health and Hackensack Meridian have applied to be able to perform blood transfusions by ground ALS. EMT numbers for 2025 – 200 EMTs approved to date (new, reciprocity, etc.), 2,220 in 2024 (1,933 new EMTs), 1,955 in 2023. Reciprocity applicants are not following the instructions causing delays in getting their NJ EMT. ALS numbers for 2025 – 1,700 active & 45 inactive, 169 approved in 2024, 137 in 2023. Dan stated there are no time extensions for EMT renewals.

Tim Seplaki spoke about a NHTSA update for gender/sex classifications, and the dashboards will be updated and improved to provide better results when searching for types of calls. He reported over 2 million ePCR files were uploaded in 2024. He reminded everyone that charts must be locked within 24 hours – there has been some improvement, but not enough. The OEMS Conference will be in November – requests to present classes will be closing soon, and awards nominations will open next month. They are expanding their precon classes and will be continuing to offer EMT CORE recertification classes during the precon.

A survey had been conducted by OEMS for stroke care; 85% of the responses were received from EMTs – approximately half of the responses were from licensed agencies and approximately 44% were from non-licensed agencies. One of the questions asked was which stroke scale is your agency using? The answers showed that pre-hospital agencies are not consistent with this; less than half use RACE scoring (RACE was added by Executive Order in 2021). Many EMTs don't know the difference between Primary and Comprehensive Stroke Centers. They are encouraging the use of Stroke Coordinators at hospitals.

During the Advisory Council meeting there were many references to the upcoming World Cup Soccer matches this year (in June and July) and to the FIFA Championship matches in 2026 (also in June and July). MetLife Stadium will be the hub for the East Coast. The EMS Task Force is working on response plans along with multiple other agencies. More information will be provided soon.

The Culture of Safety Committee met on March 25, 2025 and is still updating the Infection Control guidelines. QR codes will be generated as each set of guidelines is completed and published for easy retrieval. The Lights & Sirens guidelines and the Lifting & Moving guidelines were accepted at the December 2024 Advisory Council meeting and are awaiting being published on the OEMS website.

The State Trauma Advisory Council met on April 14, 2025 and discussed the Final Draft of the State Trauma Plan that Dr. Porter presented to the STAC members. A vote was taken to approve this draft, which was passed. The updated State Trauma Plan will be presented to the next meeting in June of the Governor's EMS Advisory Council, where a vote to accept this will be taken.

The 2025 EMSCNJ standards committee received inspection reports from 62 squads as of April 26, 2025. This represents 157 out of 492 ambulances, which were fully completed. Of the 204 registered squads in the state represent an inspection compliance rate of 35.29% for 2025. And 31.91 % of the EMSCNJ ambulances were inspected so far in 2025.

Inspection stickers are to be <u>replaced every year</u> and the new date of Dec 31 of the <u>following year</u> is punched out. New rigs must be inspected within 60 days. And the Inspection sticker taken off any rig that is sold or traded in or transferred to another service.

It is required of all patients carrying emergency vehicles to be inspected by state run inspection or private garage and a valid inspection sticker are applied to the windshield. A letter was issued to all Districts VP's and is also available on the web site. This clarifies any confusion on DMV inspections. All the standard inspection forms are also present at that site too. Any Vice President who needs EMSCNJ inspection stickers should see me at the monthly meetings. They will not be mailed please plan accordingly.

The inspection packets include a requirement for certain equipment, which have been listed as critical items; these items must be present to pass. Also, should a re-inspection need to be done it must occur within 60 days of the Initial inspection? We now require that 90% of listed items be present to pass.

Inspection stickers are to be replaced every year and the new date of December 31 of the following year punched out the number of the decal recorded and submitted with the return paperwork. <u>Please ensure that the people who are doing the inspections receive all of the paperwork.</u>
